# COMMUNITY RESPONSE TO END INEQUALITIES (CORE) PROJECT: BRIDGING THE GAPS IN HIV, TB AND VIRAL HEPATITIS HEALTHCARE



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## Introduction

CORE Project is an EU co-funded project to reduce inequalities by enhancing community responses and addressing gaps in prevention, linkage to care, and access to healthcare services for HIV, TB, and viral hepatitis in the EU Member States, and includes 24 partners from 17 countries. The 14 participating Community-Based organizations (CBOs), all community-led, will implement or scale-up tailored strategies such as capacity building, networking, exchanging good practices, and innovative approaches to promote, strengthen, and integrate community-driven approaches.

### Methods

Between February and May 2023, a comprehensive needs assessment questionnaire was formulated and distributed to the 14 Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) partnering with the CORE project. The objective was to gather information, comprising five work areas (organization profile, country's healthcare system, services and data collection and community monitoring, capacity building and training needs) in a systematic manner. This was complemented by individual interviews with CBOs to gain a deeper understanding, address specific needs, and build a collaborative environment for sharing knowledge and experiences.

# Results




Figure 1: Legal and regulatory partner's framework




Figure 2: CBO's servive offer

In most of the partnering countries, national strategies to fight HIV and viral hepatitis have been established, often accompanied by specific programs designed to address them. However, a significant challenge in successfully executing these strategies derives from the need for clear community-based guidelines for testing and linkage to care, which can hamper the efforts of Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) seeking to expand their intervention (Figure 1 and 2). These services frequently fall short of targeting the most vulnerable groups due to financial constraints or a lack of clarity in the regulations and of political will.




Figure 3: Integration of activities at CORE project

The CORE project contribution includes the addition of integrated testing for HIV, HBV, HCV, and Syphilis among CBOs not yet providing and additionally introducing innovative approaches, such as offering STI appointments, implementing CHEMESEX initiatives, and establishing Partner Notification Programs (Figure 3).
